Various publishers have sent us books for review. We decided for this issue to print only reviews of books we would recommend.

THESE BOOKS ARE PUBLISHED BY FIVE STAR LEGENDS. THE BOOKS ARE "I JUST AM", "TIC TALK", AND "RATTLESMAKE RULES".

"I Just Am" by Tom & Bryan Lambke is a book for 3rd and 4th graders and the age range would be probably 8 - 10 if you want to read it. It's a great book about not teasing and bullying anybody, or saying someone else is not normal. The subject of the book is a teenage boy who has Down syndrome and he tells about his life in pictures and words (captions). We like this book because it gives you a fun and interesting lesson that is good to learn. \$14.95, hardcover.



The next book "Tic Talk" is about a boy with Tourette Syndrome. It is by Dylan Peters, a 9 year old boy, who tells his story in his own words. It is for 2nd. 3rd, and 4th graders (possibly 5th). The age range for it would be 7 - 11. It is illustrated by Zachary Wendland and painted by Kris Taft Miller. It is a great book about differences that make you special. Tourette syndrome, if you are wondering what it is, is something when you have a problem in your brain, and you have double blinking which is holding your blinks for a longer

time, tilting your head and other things called "tics". (Not the bugs that attach to you! So don't make fun!) The book is about his life with this Syndrome. ences don't make you uncool or stuff like that and that your friends liking you or not liking you doesn't depend on your differences. We really think this is a good book and can really change the way you think about people. \$15.95, hardcover.



And last but not least is "Rattlesnake Rules" by Conrad J. Storad. There are two parts. The first part is about a rattlesnake and his adventures. He lives in the desert and travels to a jungle and sees all new animals. The 2nd part is facts and includes a diagram of the different parts of a rattlesnake. The age range is for 3rd to 5th graders. \$16.95, hardcover.

We love books, and would recommend these three for students, but don't take our word for it. We wanted to know what a teacher might think of these books so we asked Ms. Theolien, who was our 2nd grade teacher.

Ms. Theolien told us that she would recommend these books to teachers and librarians for their classrooms and libraries.

Teacher's Comments

I Just Am. This book in which a young man with Down syndrome talks about his experience is one of the most heartfelt books I have read in a long time. It is touching, funny and inspirational. T was teary-eyed while reading this book. We can learn a lot from Bryan who just wants to be who he is, he doesn't want to be labeled or be treated any differently than any of us: What is Normal? We shouldn't treat people by how they look or their disability but everyone should be treated with respect and dignity. I Just Am gives voice to children with Down syndrome and the challenges they face everyday.

In Rattlesnake Rules the author uses vivid illustrations and poetry to teach his readers about the lives of rattlesnakes— what rattlesnakes do to survive and protect themselves in the world and how humans can protect themselves from rattlesnakes. This will be a wonderful book for snake lovers all over the world sssssssssss

Tic Talk gives you a small glimpse into the life of a 9 ear old child who suffers from Tourette's syndrome and how difficult it was for him to tell his friends for fear of being teased or treated differently. This book is a great reminder to us to have tolerance and accept people for who they are. This is a great book.
